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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Swami Shraddhanand ji. It was established in 1967 and is a constituent college of the University of Delhi. True to its motto, "Shraddhawan Labte Gyanam", the college propagates the idea that those who are dedicated are the recipients of the true knowledge. Indeed, there is an incessant endeavour to inculcate dedication and discipline in the 4,382 students of the college as each and every student is extremely significant as future nation-builders. The 170 faculty members are ceaselessly working to create stimulating and enabling environment for the students. The primary focus of the 17 departments of humanities, Commerce, and Science is the proliferation of the egalitarian concept of education for all without any hierarchal dispositions. Due to the specific rural location of the college, it is all the more imperative that there should be holistic consumption of education without any discrimination as the students from all strata take admission in this institute of excellence. The faculty members are constantly encouraged to get themselves abreast with the innovative pedagogical tools that are coterminous with the global trends and have published significant numbers of articles in national and international journals.

The college amalgamates its rich cultural heritage and modern ethos in such a fashion that students are not lagging behind in extracurricular activities too. No wonder, its sustained legacy in sports both in national and international arena is unparalleled. Moreover, the participation of the students in the various committees, that organize programs and create an environment and differently abled campus, also contribute towards inculcating qualities such as democratic planning and organizational skills in them. Vision

Swami Shraddhanand College (SSNC) is named after a great Indian educationist and a social reformer, Swami Shraddhanand Ji and it is dedicated to the egalitarian concept of education for all without any hierarchal dispositions. It aims at educating the students from rural as well urban areas who belong to diverse strata of society. The vision of SSNC is to provide accessible quality higher education through technological advancements and pedagogical interventions which are coterminous with the global trends. From a humble beginning in1967 at Gandhi Ashram in Narela, to its present location in Alipur, SSNC has made great strides to become a popular co-educational institution for all the three streams of undergraduate courses. The Code of professional ethics guide all stakeholders of the College about its principles of integrity, accountability, inclusiveness, commitment and sustainability.

All the stakeholders of the college work in accordance with the **institutional policies and practices in order to achieve the vision** of the College. The College practices a well-structured system of mentoring for providing proper guidance to the students in not only choosing the suitable career options but also to infuse in them **confidence**, a sense of emotional security and a compelling sense of social responsibility. 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Mandela has once stated that "education is the most powerful weapon that you can choose to change the world" and following this dictum the college organizes various outreach programmes in collaboration with NSS, NCC and WDC in order to instil a sense of social responsibility in students towards the uplift of the underprivileged sections of the society. By providing transformative education, efforts are made to infuse the values of mutual trust, teamwork and promotion of social capital, easy sharing of knowledge, skills and resources to create a vibrant society. Ever since its foundation, the college has worked towards the realization of its vision of inclusion, inspiration, and innovation.

Mission

The mission of SSNC is to "Develop Academic Excellence, Nurture Creativity and Strengthen Ethical Values amongst Students". The institution is committed to promote a culture of impartiality, inclusiveness and learner-centric approach. It provides an integrated and multidisciplinary education to unravel the true potential of the students. It is governed by participation and contribution by all to achieve this mission. It has a practice of delegating authority and operational autonomy to all its constituted committees for a decentralized working. There is an emphasis in the institution on the fact that the learners should not only excel in their professional life by acquiring knowledge and innovative skills but also become responsible citizens by embracing human values and social ethics. To achieve the same, the college education focuses on multidisciplinarity, skill enhancement, co-curricular and extracurricular activities. All the stakeholders envision a future rooted in the glorious past of the Indian education system with the hallways of higher education welcoming all equally that further nurture an environment which is conducive for holistic development. The mainstay of the college is not only to disseminate affordable and quality education to all but also to create a **composite culture** enabling students from diverse backgrounds to co-exist. Huge reservoir of eresources is made available on different online portals through Delhi University Library System (DULS) that not only helps in developing critical thinking but also to equip them with the latest technological and learning resources that make them abreast with ever evolving world of technological advancement. As George Washington Carver has once affirmed that "education is the key to unlock the golden door of freedom"; thus. following this dictum, the mission of the college is to unlock the locks of creativity of the students so that their untapped potential in every arena, be it technological prowess, sensitivity towards marginalized communities, academic excellence or artistic endeavours can be fully realized.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

- SSNC is located in the rural suburbs of Delhi and caters to the need of educating large section of students from neighbouring areas.
- It provides education which is inclusive and suits all the diverse groups of the students.
- Its seventeen departments provide undergraduate courses for all the three streams (Humanities, Commerce and Science) and it floats the post-graduate course in Hindi.
- It is the only college in the University of Delhi which offers the course on BSc Applied Life Science with Agrochemicals and Pest management, since it is an application- based course and therefore holds special significance for those who exhibit keen interest in agriculture or have agricultural background.
- The college has strength of 170 teaching staff, out of which 124 are PhD qualified; also, a good student teacher ratio of 25.78 is maintained by the college.

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- The Accounts and Administrative staff are well versed in computer skills.
- The library is automated which houses 1,12,953 books.
- The college excels in sports facilities and gives training to the students in different games. Honing the skills of budding cricketers is SSNC's distinctive attribute and no wonder, many of our students have played at both National and International levels in the game of cricket.
- The labs, seminar hall and some of the classrooms are ICT enabled. The laboratories are well equipped.
- It has ICT enabled unit, railings, tactile paths, and washrooms for 'Divyangjan' /Differently abled.
- The college has switched to solar energy as its primary resource of energy which is indeed an eco-friendly alternative.
- The large amphitheatre of the college is effectively used for organising programmes at minimal expenditure (except in unfavourable seasons).
- SSNC is the largest IGNOU study centre of the Northern Region.
- **PG accommodation** is available close to the college in Alipur area which provides residential facilities to the students and faculty members who are from outside Delhi.
- College is under CCTV surveillance.
- There are canteen, bank and photocopy shop within the campus.
- SSNC-NSS and NCC units are quite active.
- It is well connected by bus service and is close to the National Highway.

Institutional Weakness

- The college has two campuses, so it is difficult to coordinate with the students for extra-curricular and co-curricular activities.
- Since the main library, examination branch, administrative block and accounts section are situated in the new building, therefore the easy access to these facilities is in the new building only.
- The college lacks funds for conducting in-house research projects.
- There is a need for an auditorium in the campus and also more rooms to accommodate all the courses in a single campus.

Institutional Opportunity

- SSNC provides opportunities for holistic development through participation of students in different societies like Lensation, Aina, Rivayat, etc.
- The **Eco-friendly Green campus initiatives** have been introduced from time to time to build symbiotic relationship between nature and humans for a more harmonious co- existence.
- One of the key features of the college is the 'Optimal Utilization of Resources' by providing learning platforms to students of IGNOU and SOL.
- Special emphasis has been laid to improve the skills of the learners by **giving more options in skill-based courses**.
- It is one of the six colleges of the University of Delhi which offers the course on Microbiology Hons. and is the only college that offers BSc. in Agrochemicals and Pest management.
- The college trains the students in different sports where cricket is its forte.
- Students are encouraged to join NCC and NSS.

• SSNC Gandhi study circle organises events to familiarise students with Gandhian values and ethics.

Institutional Challenge

- The admission process of college continues till the last round so completing the syllabus of the 1st Semester is a challenge.
- It is **difficult to bring down the rate of migration** of students to other colleges.
- The **student strength as compared to the sanctioned seats is reducing** which may be due to the Post Covid effect and change in the admission process at the University level.
- Due to lack of an auditorium, it is difficult to organize big events in the Seminar Hall.
- The **student progression data is very difficult to retrieve** unless each department seriously finds solution for it and works towards it.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

SSNC is committed to ensure **holistic development** of students to help them grow as skilful, responsible, and ideal citizens. It is a constituent college of the University of Delhi and was a part of its Centenary celebration in the year 2022-23. Under the directions of the University, the staff of SSNC has participated in curriculum planning, development, implementation and enrichment. It has participated in framing and revision of curriculum, paper setting, evaluation process, etc. for the UG and PG Hindi courses. The information about the college is given in the prospectus/website and it follows the academic calendar of DU. IQAC prepares the college calendar accommodating all the activities and events. The duly constituted committees like admission, timetable, workload, examination branch and grievance redressal work seamlessly round the year in tandem with one another to facilitate the execution of the curriculum. A combination of traditional and technologically enabled pedagogical tools are used for academic excellence. Continuous assessment as per DU guidelines and the implementation of students' feed-back provide scope for further improvement. The reliability and validity of internal assessment are maintained by the Moderation Committee. Students are sensitized through gender equality, environment and sustainability through talks and interactive sessions (Swachta Pakhwada, plantation drives, blood donation camps, JAZBA, etc). 48 Value-added, Certificate courses have been floated to enhance their skills. 17 percent of the students have undertaken, project, fieldwork as a part of their curriculum and have completed internships also.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Effective learning at SSNC is fostered through learner-centric education and appropriate methodologies. The institution boasts an impressive 90.64% student enrollment, with 76.84% of seats filled across various categories. There is a healthy maintenance of the student-teacher ratio of 25.78:1, which includes a dedicated team of 85.64% full-time teachers. The campus is equipped with WIFI, and each and every teacher has official Email IDs for prompt official communication. The well-equipped library provides access to E-resources. The college website serves as a repository for Program Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) across all subjects. The attainment of POs and COs are ensured through the employment of the diverse assessment methods. Course-related information is disseminated through the prospectus and orientation programs. Teaching methods entail traditional chalk and board approaches, ICT tools, and participatory

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pedagogies. The ingenious techniques and experiential learning contribute to a dynamic educational environment. The engagement of the students is conspicuous through their participation in various societies and activities, including Lensation (photography and film making), Rivayat (folk dance), Metanoia (western dance), Aaina (dramatics), Pravaad (debate), Renaissance (literary and fine arts), Swaransh (music), and more. Apart from thisthe additional courses, field trips, industrial visits, and project works are strategically planned to enhance learning outcomes.

The progress of the students is assessed through assignments, power-point presentations, and result analysis. The teachers provide support to slow learners. Amid the COVID-19 pandemic, the institution smoothly transitioned to online classes using platforms like Google Meet and Google Classroom. The internal and external assessment processes prioritize transparency, with yearly shuffling of moderation committees and a secondary check at the examination-branch level. The end-term examinations adhere to the university norms. Teachers actively support students' post-graduation endeavors by providing Letters of Recommendation (LOR). In essence, SSNC is committed to a holistic and adaptive educational approach, ensuring quality in learning experiences for its diverse student body.

Research, Innovations and Extension

SSNC ensures the creation of active and enabling academic environment which helps in fostering the culture of innovation and research. 93 seminars/webinars, workshops, etc. were organized in the last five years to enhance the discipline-centric knowledge and to create interest in the research. 137 chapters in edited volume/books are published and various papers are presented in National /International Conference Proceedings during the assessment period and 453 research papers were published in Journals of repute as well as in those which are UGC Care listed. There are two research projects and one patent to the credit of SSNC. Two laboratories, one in Chemistry and other in Botany department are dedicated to research work. Two research projects are undertaken by the faculty members of Botany and Geography department and some of them have undertaken research work at their parent departments or other institutes of their interest after teaching hours or by taking leave from the college for the same. Research council, IPR cell, incubation centre constituted to encourage innovation Webinar / Seminar on IPR and Online Awareness session on IPR in collaboration with Office of Controller General Patents, Design and Trademark, under Ministry of Commerce was organized. Extension activities were undertaken by NCC, NSS, Enactus and Saksham with the defined outcomes of promoting nation unity, patriotism, health, cleanliness, sustainable environment etc. The successful projects of Enactus are Utpadan, Astitva 2.0 and Pavitra. Outreach and Awareness activities and programs such as "Understanding Immunology can Improve Human Health" have been conducted by SSNC faculty members and SSNC has signed MOU with Saksham, Proschool, Bhanti Consultancy etc.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

SSNC has **two** campuses **with sixty-eight classrooms** and **twenty-six** well equipped laboratories. There are **two research labs** in the department of Chemistry and Botany. **8 rooms and 10 laboratories are ICT enabled.** There are **two** seminar halls one each in the old and the new campus for Co-Curricular activities. The campus is differently enabled. There is one large **Amphitheatre and Bhartendu Rang Mandap** with green room in new campus. There is multipurpose play field for **Kho-Kho**, **Kabaddi**, **Football**, **Cricket and also there are facilities for badminton, basketball, etc. The library of SSNC is automated with ILMS software having 1,12,953 books** and E-resources. It has spent **Rs. 4,67,706.50** on purchase of the books and journals.

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SOUL software is used for automation, featuring a web-based Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) for easy access to study material. The college has shifted to online process for admissions to all Undergraduate courses, centrally managed by the University of Delhi. Counseling, document verification, and fee submissions for admission are done online. The campus is under CCTV surveillance, has a Projector screen and power bank machines of A3 mobile charger at the reception. The college is Wi-Fi enabled. The four computer labs have latest educational software like TREECON, PHYLIP, MATLAB, PYTHON, etc. The college has a medical room, Girls' common room, Canteen and Photocopy shop in the campus.

Student Support and Progression

For an affirmative academic outcome and to provide necessary support to the student's multitude steps were taken at SSNC. There is provision of both merit-based and need-based scholarships under Government (PMSS) and non-Government schemes. Various capacity building and skill enhancement programmes are conducted regularly to impart soft skills, life skills, Language and Communication skills to enhance the employability of the students. The Grievance redressal is undertaken in admissions, ragging and sexual harassment as per the UGC guidelines. The three different awareness programmes on POSH Act were organized in online mode during Covid pandemic and one through offline mode by ICC. There is timely redressal of exam related complaints and even during Covid pandemic they were addressed through online by a Nodal Officer. The students crack competitive exams such as UPSC, CAT, GATE, JAM, GMAT, etc. but the available data with proofs is very less. Students are conferred with awards in extracurricular activities and sports and the number has increased to sixtyfour. They get an opportunity to showcase their skills in Shraddha Tarang Fest and in other functions. SSNC Alumni Association organised various talks on Google meet with the illustrious alumni of college. SSNC achievers in Cricket such as Yash Dhull, Himanshu Rana, Anuj Rawat, etc. have brought laurels to the institution.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The mission and **vision** of **SSNC** is achieved through the efforts of the dedicated faculty. The college follows the practice of **decentralised and participative management** that is visible in the transparent decision-making activities of the Governing Body, Principal, Vice Principal, Bursar, IQAC Convener, Public Information Officer (PIO), Administrative officer, Accounts officer, Staff Council, faculty and Administrative Staff. The college creates an estimate of the budget which is presented before the Governing Body for the approval before submitting to the sanctioning body. All financial transactions require the approval of the **Principal and** allocation and utilisation of funds is undertaken by the Purchase the Bursar. Planning, Committee, the Building Committee and the Accounts Department of the college. The Teacher in-charges, Conveners of different committees and societies shoulder the responsibilities quite efficiently. During Covid 19 pandemic college constituted a special Help Desk and addressed issues related to Examination, Admission Process and Grievance Redressal, etc. To conveniently adopt UGCF-22 under NEP-2020, NEP task force, UGCF, SEC, VAC committees were constituted. IQAC organised educational programmes to achieve high academic standards. Rules for service, appointments, finance and promotions are as per UGC norms. Some purchases are made through GeM (Government e-Market place) uses Public Finance Management System (PFMS) for financial transactions and conducts External/internal audits for accounts. IGNOU and SOL funds are used for the development of the college Feedback forms are collected, analysed and the reports on corrective measures are prepared for the further improvement.

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Institutional Values and Best Practices

There is an emphatic stress on Gender equity at SSNC and efforts have been made for maintaining clean and green campus. Women Development Cell, Internal Complaint Committee (ICC), Cultural society etc. organise relevant programmes. SSNC campus is safe with CCTV installed at different locations. The college also provides a common room for girls to be used in their free time. All festivals and days of National Importance, pertaining to Environmental Sustainability and related to valorisation of Indian Culture are celebrated in the College. Environmental consciousness is ingrained in the culture of the college and can be exhibited from the fact that the college has a grid solar power plant on the roof top with a capacity of 50 KV and there are serious measures taken for conserving the water and managing the waste. One of the practices of SSNC is maintaining an "Eco-friendly green campus". Different initiatives like, Saghan Van, Herbal Garden, Plantation Drives, Solar Panels, Paper Recycling and the Waste Management have contributed to achieve the same. Its second practice is "Niswarth Seva"; An Act of Generosity" that stresses the value of Generosity, without considering the recompense where the students learn the importance of cooperation, kindness, and assistance. It is undertaken mainly by NSS, NCC, Enactus and also by the **Departments and the Societies**. Honing the skills of the budding cricketers SSNC's distinctive attribute. College is very much committed to promote the sports activities and its distinctiveness is evident by the fact that some of our students who have excelled in cricket and have played at National and International levels such as Ankush Bains who played in Under 19 World cup, under 23 India Emerging Cup, Duleep Trophy, Deodhar Trophy, Ranji Trophy, IPL; Deepak Punia who played in Ranji Trophy and in IPL. The list includes Mayank Rawat, Himanshu Rana, Anuj Rawat and Lalit Yadav.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:

• The teachers of SSNC are fully aware of the importance of the effective implementation of the National Education Policy 2020 (NEP 2020), and took a significant step forward by forming a 13-member "NEP-2020 Taskforce Committee" on November 11, 2021. The different aspects of SEC and VAC courses were taken care by their committees. The UGCF-2022 implementation committee was formed to look after the successful introduction of the course curriculum under NEP 2020 in the year 2022. • With a view to create an appropriate ambience in the institution for the holistic implementation of NEP-2020, the different committees worked with great coordination and cooperation. • In addition to the SEC courses, VAC committee was formed to decide upon the courses and its effective implementation.16 VAC courses were offered to the first semester and 18 VAC courses were offered to the second semester students in 2022-23. 16 faculty members attended a workshop organized by the University of Delhi. • UGCF-22 under National Education Policy 2020 was implemented in the academic session 2022-23, which aims to focus on multi-disciplinary and interdisciplinary approaches of teaching and learning. • To actualize its objectives, the faculty has participated in restructuring and framing of the syllabus for Undergraduate Curriculum Framework (UGCF) and is well-prepared for multidisciplinary pedagogy. • The skill enhancement and orientation towards research are the main hallmarks of the changed curriculum. It also focuses on internship and apprenticeship that are essential requisites for capacity building and inculcating competence for employment. The college organized seminars, add-on courses (mushroom cultivation, legal awareness, interdisciplinary research, ICT tools, etc), workshops ("Analysing Social Media" and Online advertising", "Data Visualization", "Project Finance" and an online Add-on Course on "Legal Awareness", etc.) to abreast the faculty and students with the skill enhancement courses and there are future plans to organize more programs in the similar direction. • As NEP focuses on providing multidisciplinary education to the learners, SSNC has given the 'choice options' to the students through Google Forms for the papers of GE, SEC, DSE and VAC. They may choose from the pool of papers for which

the departments are well-equipped and have planned to work on the same. The purpose is to provide thorough understanding of the topic through multiple disciplinary approaches. 2. Academic bank of credits (ABC): • The Academic Bank of Credit (ABC) is a virtual portal for records of academic credits secured by the students. It provides credit mobility which can help students to redeem the credits that they have earned from different universities to get a certificate, diploma or degree accordingly. Thus, the learners can avail the benefits of the options of multiple entry and exit during the program that they have chosen. • It is compulsory for each and every student enrolled at Delhi University for the 2022-23 academic year to get registered into the Academic Bank of Credit portal by logging to www.abc.gov.in and once the account is created, the credits are deposited into the account of the student after the completion of every year. • The option to open the ABC account is also available in the examination form filled by the student for every semester. SSNC follows the guidelines issued by the University of Delhi regarding Academic Bank of Credits. • ABC will help in executing Multiple Entry and Exit System (MEES) for UGCF-22. • NEP task force and UGCF implementation committees were formed in the college to acquaint about the same to the learners. • The college has an efficient technical staff and a dedicated examination cell. • The National Education Policy has revolutionized 3. Skill development: the approach of the education system as it gives impetus to skill-based learning. • SEC Committee was formed on October 20, 2022 to streamline the implementation of SEC courses offered by the institution as per NEP. The college offered 16 SEC courses to the students of the first semester and 16 SEC courses to the students of the second semester in the academic year 2022-23 • Along with the regular academic prowess, the skills including problemsolving, critical thinking, creativity and communication are very essential for professional growth and development. • Skill development nurtures the students in such a way that they can effectively adapt to the dynamic changes in societal and professional sphere. • The college offers Skill Enhancement Courses in all disciplines which are

aimed to provide hands-on-training, competency,

proficiency and skills to students. • Students can choose from a pool of skill-based courses like, Basic IT Tools, Communication in Everyday Life, Document Preparation and Presentation Software, Apiculture, Bio Fertilisers, Finance for everyone, etc. • The college offers add-on-courses for the enrichment of their skills in their areas of interest which will be useful for them in securing jobs and also for entrepreneurship, start-ups, etc. It inculcates innovative ideas in the students and keep them abreast with the global demands. Some of the courses offered in the last five years are Solar Technology Installation to Business, Industrially Relevant aspects of Food Safety and Microbiology, Mushroom Cultivation, Techniques in Interdisciplinary Research, Information and Communication Technology and Legal Awareness. The college encourage students to attain knowledge from NPTEL and MOOCS.

4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):

• The college focuses on appropriate integration of Indian knowledge system for ensuring overall development of the students. • Papers related to Indian Language and Indian Culture are offered to the students (Culture and Communication, Sahitya Sanskriti aur Cinema, Ethics and Values in Ancient Indian Tradition, etc.) and with the help of various societies in the college, regular programs are conducted for the better understanding of the relevant papers. • Teachers in the college are regularly encouraged for bilingual teaching and a conducive atmosphere is created so that students should feel comfortable in interacting in their preferred mode of language. • The college organises Swami Shraddhanand Memorial lecture every year. • SSNC celebrates Hindi Diwas, Hindi Saptah, Munshi Premchand Jayanti, and organized expert talks on Hindi language like "Hindi ka Vaishvik Pradrishya', "Bhartiya Bhashaaon ki PunerPritishtha, etc. • Webinars were organised on "Meri matra bhasha meri pehchan" and "Bhartiya sanskriti evam dharohar". • Collaborating with Siksha Sanskriti UtthanNyas, the Taskforce Committee conducted two workshops namely "Vocational and Skill-based Education in NEP-2020" on Nov.19, 2021 and "NEP-2020: Integrated Approach to Language, Art and Culture for Learner's Holistic Development" on Nov.25, 2021 to not only inculcate interest in Indian

Knowledge system but also to familiarize and acclimatize the faculty and the students with different dimensions of NEP-2020. A talk was organise on Bhartiya Gyan Parampara aur Rashtiya Shiksha Niti by Hindi Department on 16th September 2021. • Papers on Indian Language including Hindi and Sanskrit are offered to the students like Sahitya Sanskriti Aur Cinema, Srijanatmak Lekh ke Aayaam, etc. • Students are encouraged to opt for the papers on traditional language, culture and classical tradition to comprehend the glorious past of India (Bhartiya Bhakti: Parampara aur Manav Mulye, Ecology and Literature, etc). This helps in creating interest in Indian knowledge system, cultural practices and traditional values. • A two day National seminar was organized on "Ram Katha Ke Vibhin Aayam" on 19-20 March, 2021. • Aiming to recreate and synergise our traditional knowledge pertaining to art, culture and language, the committee organized a one day National Seminar titled "Indian Knowledge System and NEP-2020" on Dec.6, 2021. The idea was to address issues regarding contemporary academic challenges through traditional knowledge systems. Research papers on topics such as "The Role of Indian Knowledge System in Nation Building", "Indian Knowledge System towards an Atam Nirbhar Bharat", "Indian Knowledge System and Human Values", "Opportunities and Challenges in Implementation of NEP-2020", etc. were presented at the seminar. • SSNC plans to encourage online seminars and courses which focus on Indian Knowledge system. College website provides links for National repositories like Swayam, SOL digital resource, E pustakdwar and Swayam Prabha.

5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

The focus of NEP is the outcome-based student centric teaching learning. The programme and coursewise outcomes are outlined in the syllabus so as to impart an education by which the learner is able to use/practice what is learnt professionally and personally. The faculty is engaged in designing their own Pedagogical Tools which include experiential learning (field-based, project-based learning), collaborative learning (group discussion, case studies, surveys), etc. to train the learners for the attainment of Programme Outcomes (Pos) and Course Outcomes (COs) Most of the courses are designed with the focus on the Assignments, Presentations, Problem

based Learning and Project based Learning to achieve Outcome based education. SSNC is prepared to emphasise on the same and faculty has participated in the syllabi framing of their respective subjects. The college aims to orient and train the learners for Outcome based education as it provides opportunities to attain proficiency and fluency in the subjects of choice and analyse their weaknesses and strengths successfully.

6. Distance education/online education:

• The infrastructure of SSNC is conducive for online and distance learning as it is WiFi enabled. Also, some of the rooms are ICT enabled; computer labs and other laboratories have sufficient computers and projectors. • SSNC is the biggest centre of Indira Gandhi National University (IGNOU), New-Delhi in the Northern India and the college is well prepared for distance learning programs. • Teachers are connected with the learners through variety of platforms like print and electronic study material, Google meet, Google classroom, WhatsApp, Face-to-Face interactions and other Learner Support Services. The students who are unable to get admission in the regular courses get an opportunity to upgrade their education through distance learning. • This has given impetus to an easier, more flexible and self-learning system for the learners specially for those who reside in remote areas and also to those who want to pursue their degrees along with their jobs. • It is very costeffective mode and provides access to learn specialized subjects even in remote areas. • Besides providing counselling to IGNOU students for theory papers, the practical concepts are actually taught by the faculty members of the college during vacations and weekends. The students are marked on the basis of an evaluation scheme where 30 percent of the total marks are obtained from theory exam and 70 percent through their continuous assessment and attendance in their scheduled classes. • Various online tools are employed for teaching in regular classes and online softwares are used for subjects such as Computational biology, Bioinformatics, Maths, etc. • Google classroom was a boon during Covid Pandemic to deliver information/notes/assignments and practicals. A Workshop on "Google Classroom: Teaching, Learning and Managing" was organized by the department of computer science. • Google meet platform is used post pandemic to conduct online

events and for informative seminars. All the staff is well trained for online teaching post Covid Pandemic.

- The holistic consumption of education is directly proportional to the effective implementation of the curriculum. The clarity pertaining to the goals and objectives is imperative for developing not only skill proficiency in students but also their holistic development which further gives impetus to the formation of ideal citizens
- The specific aim of education should be clearly manifested in the curriculum framework. **Swami Shraddhanand College (SSNC)** is a constituent college of **University of Delhi (DU)** which is one of the reputed Central Universities of India.
- **SSNC** was a part of its **Centenary celebrations** in 2022-2023 which was meant to rejoice its glorious past.
- It follows all the directions of **DU** for the courses and curriculum. The college operates at **UG** and **PG** levels (Hindi only).
- Faculty members of **SSNC** have always contributed towards **framing/revision of the curriculum.**
- **IQAC** prepares a calendar of events for the entire academic year.
- **SSNC** prepares a detailed **prospectus** displayed on its website, imparting information about the college, staff, courses offered, admission process, sports and extracurricular activities, etc.
- A workload committee is constituted that includes teachers representing different disciplines. It assesses the workload of every department given by Teacher in-charges.
- The student's choice regarding optional papers is collected through online Google forms.
- Time Table Committee designs the Master Time Table for all UG programs as per the University norms which are shared with the concerned teacher in-charges, for preparing Departmental timetable to be displayed on the notice board and website.
- The **administrative section** of the college prepares the **attendance sheets** to maintain records and facilitate the submission of the data at the end of the semester.
- During **covid-19 pandemic**, **the students were taught through online classes**. All the teachers were directed to optimize **ICT tools** during their classes.
- Various **pedagogical practices** form the fabric of the teaching-learning process: **Chalk and talk, Power-point presentations, illustrative models, ICT tools,** etc. Faculty members exercise autonomy to employ a variety of teaching-learning methods.
- SSNC is one of the pioneer colleges at the University of Delhi which offered Physical Education as Generic Paper under Choice Based Credit System.
- SSNC academic calendar of events is invariably congruous with the calendar of the University.
- Modular plans are prepared as per 'timetable of the class' based on the academic calendar.
- It follows **formative and summative assessment** approaches in concurrence with the DU norms. **Formative assessment is based on continuous and comprehensive evaluation and summative**

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- **assessment assesses** the students. The pattern of the examination, developed by **DU**, is strictly followed by the college.

- Character building is highly valued, and students are encouraged to evolve into better individuals through discourse in seminars, workshops, and other activities.
- **SSNC** has been committed to pioneering women's education and empowerment. Also, Gender-Sensitive education is at the heart of the institution.
- The additional curriculum includes numerous activities such as **seminars**, **webinars**, **talks**, **workshops**, **awareness programs** and **career counseling sessions** to enhance academic skills related to relevant issues.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1

Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences and teachers use ICT- enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning process

Response:

- The teaching process is maintained in a **student-centric manner** by involving them in **academic**, **non-academic**, **co-curricular**, **and extra-curricular activities**. **Seminars**, **webinars**, **workshops**, **add-on courses**, **symposia**, **conferences**, **and practical training** are organized for students and teachers to train them in new emerging methodologies and techniques of the teaching-learning process.
- Class tests are conducted and assignments and projects are given and discussed postsubmission. Special attention is given to weaker students for better comprehension.
- The enabling unit has ICT tools for visually impaired learners.
- Experiential learning is part of the curriculum in some of the Skill-Enhancement Courses and GE courses such as Apiculture, Digital Marketing, Basic IT Tools, and Biodiversity.
- Students are also encouraged to undergo **internship programs** outside the college during vacations.
- The students participate in activities of societies like Lensation (photography and filmmaking), Rivayat (folk dance), Metanoia (western dance), Aaina (dramatics), Pravaad (debate), Renaissance (literary and fine arts), Swaransh (music), and Majestic Drovers (fashion), etc.
- SSNC organizes student activities such as Blood Donation Camps, Tree Plantation drives, and Swachh Bharat Abhiyan to promote the spirit of the teamwork.
- Some departments publish a **departmental magazine**and also organize their annual **program** and fest where academic experts are invited to deliver lectures to supplement the curriculum teaching.
- Besides inter-college competitions including **debates**, **poster-making**, **quizzes**, **best out of waste**, **are** held for collaborative learning.
- Teachers have also adapted **flipped classroom** model to maximize face-to-face class time and work with students individually.
- The college is **Wi-Fi** enabled, and the faculty members are given a **college email ID** for sharing information with the students. They utilize a variety of methods to facilitate the teaching-learning process, incorporating **ICT** tools such as **projectors**, **Power Point presentations**, **virtual laboratories**, **internetbased learning materials** (**e-notes**, **videos and PPTs**), **e-resources accessible through the college library** (**e-books**, **e-newspapers**, **databases**, **e-journals**, **etc**), **and Google classroom** for disseminating notes and conducting continuous student assessments.
- Links to national digital repositories like MHRD ICT, SOL Digital, eYantra, and ePathshalaare available on the college website for an easy access.
- Students are taught to usesoftware like Python, Philip, TREECON, Mathemetica, Texstudio, Statistical sofware: R and Tally for subjects like Bioinformatics, Computational Biology, Mathematics etc.
- Different educational programs are shared on social media platforms like **Twitter**, **Instagram**, and **YouTube**.
- The teachers used the **Google Meet** platform during **COVID-19** to conduct online **lectures**, **share Power-Point presentations** and demonstrate experiments virtually to the students.
- The teachers keep themselves updated through advanced courses such as COURSERA, SWAYAM, NPTEL, and the ICT initiatives of MHRD. They also attend workshops and seminars on digital literacy, MOODLE, and GOOGLE classroom.
- The college has a webpage for the **NPTEL local chapter**, with a faculty member nominated as **SPOC** for disseminating information about its courses.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time-bound and efficient

Response:

SSNC is a constituent college of the University of Delhi, and it follows the internal assessment and external evaluation criteria as per the **university regulations**.

Internal Assessment: At the beginning of the each semester, students are informed about the details of internal and external assessments during the departmental orientation program. They are also instructed to check the University website for the IA rules and notifications.

- The **prospectus** of the college also outlines the mechanism for **internal assessment (IA).** The schedule of the class tests is displayed on the college website and notice boards, and students are also individually notified by their respective teachers.
- To further ensure the transparency of the process, an **attendance sheet is signed by each student at the time of class tests, practicals, and end-term examinations**. Once the evaluation process is complete, answer sheets and assignments are discussed with the students. After the compilation of the internal assessment, it is verified by the students. A record of internal assessment is also maintained by the examination branch of the college.
- The Moderation of internal assessment is first done by the three-member departmental moderation committee which comprises previous, current and upcoming teacher-in-charges and then sent to the examination branch of the college for further scrutiny. It is then displayed on the college website and the grievances of the students are dealt by the concerned moderation committee within a stipulated time before its final submission to the university. The notifications for the IA submission are issued by the examination branch of the college.
- The **internal assessment process** for the practical component of the paper is congruous with the **guidelines provided by the individual departments**. The tutorials were also conducted for commerce and humanities streams where students discussed important topics and participated in IA as per the guidelines of the university.
- 1. External Assessment: Students appear for their end-term examinations at the college which is

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being conducted by the university, and the college ensures that there is a fair conduct of these examinations. The clear instructions regarding the conduct of the exams are given before the start of the exams by the teachers. To ensure the fair conduct of the examination, a teacher is not given a duty on a particular day, when his/her ward/ near relative is appearing for the examination.

- 2. During OBE, special training sessions were organized by the OBE Nodal officer of the college and all the queries related to question papers were promptly addressed by the exam branch and the OBE team of the college. WhatsApp groups for the students were also created for OBE to tackle all issues pertaining tothe students during examination such as difficulty in downloading the question papers or uploading the answer scripts, etc.
- 3. The university maintains confidentiality in the paper setting and evaluation processes. All the examination-related queries and grievances of the students are being addressed at the university level.

Response:

SSNC offers various courses in the **Arts, Science, and Commerce** streams. Being a part of the **University of Delhi (DU),** the **Program Outcomes (PO) and Course Outcomes (CO)** are in accordance with the **guidelines and syllabus available on the DU website**. These outcomes have been designed by the university to prepare students for the higher education, employment and to become productive members of the society. Besides, it fosters multicultural **competence, communication skills, social justice, digital literacy, lifelong learning interest and moral and ethical awareness**. The college employs various methods for communicating and evaluating of POs and COs.

- **POs** are communicated to the students in the **orientation program** by the principal of the college. An induction program is also conducted at the departmental level for the newly admitted students. During this program, the teacher-in-charge and the teachers of the concerned departments discuss the course objectives (COs) with the students.
- The **Program-specific and the Course-specific outcomes** are also available on the website of the **University and the website of the College** for all its stakeholders.
- It helps the students to make informed choices regarding the SEC, GE and DSE papers.
- Besides regular classroom teaching, add-on courses, field trips, industrial visits, and project works are planned for the attainment of the learning outcomes.
- Assignments and PowerPoint presentations by the students help in assessing their learning outcomes and their areas of concern.

- Seminars, webinars, conferences and workshops, etc. are also organized so that the students can have the opportunity to interact with the specialists of the various fields and can gain a better understanding pertaining to their courses.
- The teachers continuously upgrade their knowledge through refresher courses, FDP, PDP, etc. for the better transmission of knowledge to improve learning outcomes. Various in-house talks with the experts were organized for the better implementation and adaptation of NEP 2020, with the aim to comprehend the program outcomes.

Response:

Both formal and informal mechanisms are followed for the evaluation of POs and COs. Course assessment has two parts:

- Continuous Evaluation (CE) (Assignments, projects, presentation, Class Test, etc.) and End Term Examination. A set of criteria which are evaluation based are used for assessment of COs. It is the attainment of the course outcome which is indicative of attainment of POs.
- Teachers adopt various methods to continuously assess and evaluate programme and course outcomes, including class tests, assignments, projects, presentations and end-term examinations as per the requirement of the formal syllabus prescribed by the university. Slow learners are identified and given special attention by the teachers during the class, and extra time is devoted to them as well.
- The result analyses give a clear picture of COs and POs attainment. It is done for the different courses by **SSNC-IQAC** and the data show that for the last five years **more than 85 per cent** of the students **cleared their final year** examinations.
- The results of year 2022-23 show an overall drop in the students clearing their final year examination though eight out of fifteen courses offered in the college, show more than 90 percent of the students passing their final year examination. The reasons were looked for and after thorough discussion of IQAC with the TICs, it was attributed to post covid effects or weak academic base due to Covid19.
- In order to improve the performance of the students and to attain course out comes the **IQAC** and the **teachers-in-charge**s hold meetings to list the academic interventions for improvement.
- Participation of the students in the various societies such as **Sooksham**, **Commania**, **Animalia**, **Lensation**, **etc**. of the college along with their participation in **Enactus**, **NCC** and **NSS** inculcates discipline, communication skills and leadership qualities. This prepares students to face the challenges of the real-world and contributes to the **POs**.
- The meritorious students are awarded prize on the annual day for achieving academic positions.

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- College has a **placement cell** that provides a platform for the students to explore the variety of career options and interact with the prospective employers.
- Every year, a number of students pursue higher studies in their respective fields based on the **letters of recommendation** provided by the faculty members.
- College conducts interactive sessions with **alumni** to assess the attainment of POs through their achievements.

- Two labs, one in the Chemistry and the other in the Botany department are dedicated to research work.
- Research council is also constituted in the institution.
- The faculty also continues their research work in their parent departments or other institutes of their interest.
- **Study leaves** are granted to the faculty members to pursue their research.
- In the last five years, the total number of workshops, seminars and conferences conducted are 93 and 453 research papers are published.

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- A two-day conference was organised by chemistry department on "Recent Trends in Chemical Sciences and Sustainable Energy" RTCSSE, 24-25 march 2023.
- Two days National Workshop on "Vedic Mathematics" was organised, 6-11thJan 2022 focusing on Indian Knowledge system.
- Department of Microbiology organized a seminar on IPR and on Industry-Academia Interaction "Bridging the Gap", a lecture on "Biotech Industry Startup: Entrepreneurship prospects in India" in 2019 and a webinar on "Own your ideas: Intellectual property rights", in 2020 on Google meet.
- Zoology Department organised a webinar IPR and Online Awareness session on 11th Jan 2022, in collaboration with the Office of the Controller General of Patents, Designs, and Trademarks, Ministry of Commerce (NIPAM) under Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav.
- IPR cell is formed in the college.

4.1.1

Response:

- The college has **2 campuses** with 46 classrooms in the old campus and 22 classrooms in the new campus. Out of the total of **68 classrooms**, 8 classrooms have **LCD projectors** and **pull-down screens**.
- There are **26 well equipped laboratories** in different departments: **Botany-** 4 with **a research laboratory**, **Chemistry-** 5 with two **instrumentation laboratories** and **a research laboratory**, **Microbiology-** 2 **ICT** enabled laboratories, **Physics-** 4 laboratories and **2 dark rooms**, **Zoology-** 4 laboratories with a **museum** and **Geography-** 2 laboratories. There is adequate **computing equipment** like spectrophotometer, microscope with tab, L.C.R. Meter etc in different laboratories.
- The college has 5 **ICT enabled Computer laboratories with printers**: one with 27 computer systems in the new campus, in the library with 20 systems, for **OMSP** with 30 laptops and two with 20 laptops each in the old campus.
- The **Enabling Unit** has 2 computer systems for physically challenged students and teachers.
- The college has **2 ICT enabled seminar rooms** one in the old campus with seating capacity of 200 and one in the new campus with seating capacity of 100 for conducting academic programs. There are **2 ICT enabled committee rooms** with seating capacity of 30 for small group meetings.
- The college new campus has Administrative block, Accounts block, Examination office, Staff room, NAAC room, IQAC room, Caretaker room and ICT enabled reception with 2 power bank machines of A3 mobile chargers.
- The college is **Wi-Fi enabled**.

Library

- It has a collection of over 1,12,953 books, which includes textbooks, general books, references, periodicals, and Braille material.
- The library is automated using the **SOUL 3.0** software, enabling easy access through the **Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC)**. It offers access to a vast range of digital resources, including over **2 lakhs e-books** and **6,000 plus e-journals** through **INFLIBNET NLIST** Consortium and **Delhi University Library System (DULS) subscriptions**.
- The library **caters to visually challenged** students with assistive tools. Though main library is in the new campus but reading room and books issuing facility is also in the old campus.

- The college library plays a pivotal role in supporting the institution's educational endeavours. With a diverse collection, advanced automation systems, and a commitment to embracing modern technologies, the **SSNC** Library provides a conducive environment for both faculty and students. It houses a rich collection of over **1,12,953 books**, including sections dedicated to textbooks, general books, references, periodicals, and Braille materials.
- The library utilizes **SOUL** software for automation, featuring a web-based **Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC)** for easy access to materials.
- The users are issued barcode identity cards for streamlined check-in and check-out with borrowing limits for different categories.
- Access to more than **2 lakh e-books** and **6000+ e-journals** is provided through **INFLIBNET NLIST Consortium** and **Delhi University Library System (DULS)**. The library also caters to visually challenged students with assistive tools and a Braille collection.
- The library leverages technology to support its services, utilizing the **URKUND software** for plagiarism checks.
- A visitors' register is kept at the entrance to keep a check on the footfall in the library.

The SSNC Library provides the following services/facilities:

- Circulation service including Inter-Library Loan services
- Reference Service
- User Guidance Service/Helpdesk
- Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC)

The library is automated using Software for University Libraries (SOUL) - the latest version 3.0 unlimited edition.

- **SOUL 3.0** consists of six modules and each module has been divided into sub-modules as per functional requirement, for example, Acquisition, Cataloguing, Circulation, Serial Control, OPAC and Administration.

- IT infrastructure consists of all components that play a vital role in the overall development and IT-enabled operations.
- The committees of the college take care of the maintenance of IT facilities and the upgradation of devices from time to time.
- Teachers use various **ICT based tools for teaching**.
- Software like **TREECON**, **PHYLIP**, **MATHEMATICA**, **PYTHON**, **R** etc. are used in Bioinformatics, Computational Biology, Computers and Mathematics departments as per their requirement.
- The library has facilities available for the students to use ICT.
- The **five computer labs are fully internet enabled** and run the latest Educational softwares required as per the curriculum.
- **Projectors, Printers**, etc. are provided as required by each department in the college.
- Laptops are issued to faculty members to enable them to use ICT in education.
- Classrooms and laboratories of various departments are equipped with projectors for the use of

various software tools during classes by the teachers and presentations by the students.

- Two seminar rooms and two committee rooms are equipped with ICT facilities.
- The classes during pandemic were held through digital platforms (Google Meet & Google Classroom).
- For **optimum utilization of IT resources**, College has shifted to the online process, centrally maintained by the University of Delhi **for admissions to all the undergraduate courses**. All the processes of counselling, document verification, and fee submissions are done online now. This has made the completion of the admission process seamless and the college remained totally online during Covid-19 pandemic.
- The entire college is **Wi-Fi enabled** including Academic Block, Library, Staff rooms, Faculty rooms, Classrooms and Principal's office.
- The internet facility is supported by a private vendor with a **bandwidth of 1GB** and an **optical fibre** connection provided by the University of Delhi with a bandwidth ranging from **250Mbps to 1GB**. Almost all the machines in the college are connected with the Internet through wired (Optical Fiber) and/or wireless networks of the college through a given user id / password.
- In addition to the systems available in computer labs, each department is allocated a certain number of laptops/ desktops as teaching aid.
- The campus is under **CCTV surveillance** with **52 cameras** that ensure the safety of our students and the campus.
- The college also has a **projector screen opposite to the reception area** to keep students informed about the latest developments in the college.
- The **SOUL software** for library management system that takes care of issuing, returning and maintaining records of the library was updated from **SOUL 2.0 to SOUL 3.0 on 18th August 2021.**
- The **JAWS** home talking software was purchased by the enabling unit on 25th January 2018.
- The software for **Payroll/ Pension/ PF/ Fees/Administration** purchased from Brightways Consultants is regularly updated, **08th May 2022** being the last date of updation.

- The college has functional **Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)**
- SSNC successfully implemented UGCF in the year 2022 as per NEP guidelines.
 - IQAC, NEP-Task Force committee, UGCF implementation committee, VAC and SEC committees worked together to familiarise the learners and faculty about the change in course curriculum.
 - SSNC is focussed on skill development, MEES, multidisciplinary and ABC
- SSNC governance, leadership and management has played important role in the sustained institutional growth.
 - It has worked to ensure quality in **teaching learning**, **administration**, **accounts**, **admission process**, **and all the support services**.
 - The academic results are regularly analysed by **IQAC** and methods adopted for improving the performance of the learners.
 - SSNC conducts Academic and administrative audit.
 - The physical facilities are upgraded and maintained.
 - The infrastructure extension, use of alternate source of energy, automation of library, recruitment of teaching and nonteaching permanent staff and their professional growth, social media updating, good academic and sports performance are some of the indicators of SSNC governance working in accordance to its mission and vision.  - The Governing Body includes representatives from the University of Delhi and Delhi State Government, Principal as the Secretary and teaching and non-teaching members. The Chairman is elected in the governing body through voting by the members.
 - An **Admission Helpdesk Committee** solves admission-related issues.

- Different committees/societies with student volunteers function for the knowledge enrichment like Commania, Chemica, Bhoogolika, Sanskrit Parishad, United Nations Organisation society, Sookshma, Animalia, etc.
- The **Staff Council** is empowered to undertake administrative responsibilities. Under its aegis, different committees are formed for a period of one year with members from the different departments.
- The college appoints a **Nodal Officer**, constitutes college admission committee and **Grievance Redressal Committee** for the transparent admission process. Each department has a **TIC**, for one year, appointed on a **rotational basis**. Departments organize programs under the guidance of **TIC/Convenor/Coordinator**.

- The organizational structure of SSNC is depicted in organogram on the college website and the members work in a decentralized and transparent manner.

- **IQAC** has **the principal as the chairperson** and a **Convenor** with other members who ensure the quality enhancement.
- The Staff Council forms committees to delegate the duties to faculty.
- The **timetable and workload committees** request and justify the additional posts in the various departments following the **Roster as per theUGC guidelines**.
- **SSNC** encourages research-orientated activities as per the guidelines of the Research and Development Cell and Central Instrumentation Facility of the University of Delhi.

Appointments and Service Rules:

- Appointments are done after **scrutiny** of the forms by the **scrutiny committee**.
- SSNC follows proper service rules for granting leave, LTC, promotions, etc. The approved roster for appointments and service rules as mandated by the University of Delhi is followed stringently.
- Proper **documentation of the service record**s of its staff is maintained.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

SSNC employs multiple strategies for managing fund mobilisation, utilisation and undertakes financial audits.

Mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds

- It receives funds from different sources:
 - 95% grant-in-aid from the Government of India through UGC and 5% grant-in-aid from Delhi Government.
 - Student fee.
 - SOL and IGNOU.
 - Alumni.
- Fund from **UGC** for the construction/repair of its building after the submission and approval of the detailed plans
- Salary, retirement benefits and non-salary components are all included in the Annual Maintenance Grant. The college creates a budget estimate which is presented before the Governing Body (GB) for approval before submitting to the sanctioning body. All financial

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- transactions require the approval of the Principal and the Bursar.
- Planning, allocation and utilisation of funds are undertaken by the **Purchase Committee**, the **Building Committee and the Accounts department** of the college.
- Funds are apportioned among the departments as per the number of the students and the departmental needs.
- The fund is used for **student-centric development** programs and facilities.
- Scholarship money given to the students on annual day is properly documented.
- SSNC also serves as a learner-support centre for conducting classes for SOL and IGNOU students.
- In order to achieve accountability and transparency in financial transactions, it **undergoes internal and external financial audits**.
- SSNC adheres to all the rules, regulations, and standards set out by the GFR rules of the Government of India.
- Majority of payments are made through the **Public Finance Management System (PFMS) to maintain the transparency**. Some purchases done for the institution are made through **Government e-marketing (GeM) portal** after the approval of the duly constituted purchase committee.
- All procurement requirements including the solicitation of **quotations and tenders are followed** and proper bills (including GST, if applicable) are documented.

Financial audits

- The books of accounts and financial statements of the college are prepared following the professional accounting standards. The utilisation of grants is regularly **audited by chartered accountant.**
- External Financial Audit: Auditors from the office of the Comptroller and Auditor General of India(CAG) undertake the mandatory external audit of finance. Any audit objections are addressed and minor errors of omissions and commissions identified by the audit team are rectified and appropriate responses, including Action Taken Reports (ATR) are provided to the auditors.
- The audited balance sheets and reports for each financial year are available on the college website.

The Context: SSN College has two campuses and inherit a beautiful and serene atmosphere. The pristine environment of college is not only beneficial to the staff and students but the neighbouring areas too. The best practice of making the "**Eco-friendly Green Campus**" is gearing up the environmental and socio-economic targets of achieving sustainable development. For this **SSNC** is constantly improving its ambience and preserving the environment for future generations.

- **SSNC** was the first college who offered physical education paper as an option for General Elective subjects.
- The department of physical education not only takes care of the physical development but also focuses on mental, social and emotional development of sportspersons. Such sports activities help in developing leadership skills and boosts self-confidence in them. Students acquire the qualities of time management and discipline.
- SSNC students regularly participate in various inter-college and intervarsity sports activities where cricket is our forte.
- The faculty constantly work to guide the students, tap their potential and enhance their skills. We have nurtured the young cricketers so that they could show their talents in different tournaments and have brought laurels by winning prizes. Some of our talented students participated in **U-19**

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World cup, Ranji Trophy and IPL.

- **SSNC** provides the best environment and facilities for the young emerging cricketers to grow and create significant place in both the national and the international arena.
- Special ground and sports material are provided liberally to the students and they are encouraged to participate in different events/tournaments.
- Sports prize distribution is held annually to applaud the winners of the different matches / tournaments and best quality cricket kits are given to them.
- It is due to the constant support and guidance provided for honing the cricketing skills of the young students that very good cricketers emerge from **SSNC** each year.
- In the final of **OM NATH SOOD MEMORIAL TOURNAMENT**, four players named Himanshu Rana, Dhruv Kaushik, Sumit Mathur and Lakshya Thareja performed extremely well and took team to the final. Arjun Rapriya, Yash Jeet Balhara and Rishabh Sharma were the best bowlers and helped the team to reach the final.
- College team was the runners up in the first late Sita Rani Juneja Memorial cricket tournament. The major highlight of the game was 91 runs scored by the star Cricketer of the college, Yash Dhul in the final. Also, Bharat Sindhwani with 56 runs and Arjun Rapriya with 3 wicket also contributed immensely in the final game. Himanshu Rana, Dhruv Kaushal, Sumit Mathur and Dhruv Singh were top performers of the tournament. Ramesh Prasad and Yash Jeet Balhara were the best bowlers.
